

The Country: Learning about West Europa

Welcome to West Europa. This established European democracy situated in the heart of Europe stands ready to hold parliamentary elections. As party activists representing six different parties—each with its own unique message and constituency—you will compete for the loyalty and votes of the West European electorate. The election campaign that you will collectively stage will decide the future of West Europa.

Learning Objectives

In this module, you will:

- Learn the demographic, socioeconomic, and geographic profile of West Europa
- Understand the main electoral trends and backgrounds of the parties you will be representing
- Appreciate the challenges facing West Europa, which are similar to those facing real countries in Europe today
- Summarize key information for a briefing
- Organize and plan the ongoing work of a small group

Specific Tasks

1. Organize Party Groups

General overview: Your professor will assign you to a group. Group members will set up a reliable means of group communication.

Each module contains learning objectives, specific tasks, and additional resources.

Note to the Instructor

If you have two classes that are simultaneously running the full simulation, consider holding two debates, back to back.

Consider offering extra credit to students who bring along their own supporters to the debate—perhaps even equipped with campaign materials and questions for the debaters.

A week before the debate begins, each party leader should randomly draw another party's name so that a question for that party's leader can be prepared. Students should be instructed not to share their questions with other parties.

Gray boxes indicate instructor specific material. These are invisible to students and include:

- additional context,
- guidance,
- suggestions on alternative assignments,
- and templates for activities and tasks.

West Europa has six political parties, each with its own political history and policy positions.

Party 1

Founded in 1908, [Party #1] is West Europa's oldest and historically most powerful political party. Since World War II, it has been a member of the country's governing coalition for more than forty years. Originally created as a political organization representing the country's majority Roman Catholics, it has since become an inclusive, center-right party running on a social-conservative agenda. Its platform appeals primarily to the nation's upper-middle class and rural farmers. It reached its political dominance in the early 1980s, when it replaced a deeply unpopular [Party#2] with a coalition government that also included [Party#3]. The electoral success of [Party #1] was founded on the promise of reforming the West European economy by reducing the influence of the country's trade unions and modernizing its industrial sector. The subsequent economic growth that occurred during the 1980s reinforced the party's image as good economic managers—a reputation that helped secure its position as the dominant party until 2000.

[Party #1]'s constituents are divided between its rural base, which includes practicing Catholics primarily interested in the party's social agenda, and a more


